Defining Graduation Cohorts and Rates

How are students assigned to a graduation cohort?

- A graduation cohort includes all students who entered 9th grade for the first time in the state of Louisiana in a given academic year.
- Students are counted as part of the cohort unless they transfer out of Louisiana high schools into school elsewhere.

How is the graduation rate determined?

• The cohort graduation rate represents the number of students in a graduation cohort that graduate within four years, divided by the total number of students in the cohort.

What processes are used to ensure the accuracy of cohort graduation data?

- The state, districts, and schools regularly review course and testing results to ensure all data are accurate and that all graduating students have met all requirements.
- The Department audits the records of students who are exited from the cohort, to make sure that they have left the state and been enrolled in school elsewhere.


The Class of 2015

The class of 2015 graduated with an all-time high cohort graduation rate of 77.5 percent. This is a 2.9 percent increase from 2014, and the second largest gain in the past 10 years.

As expectations for educators and schools have increased in Louisiana, so has student performance.

The class of 2015

- was the first cohort of students to participate in the state's LA-4 prekindergarten program;
- achieved the highest-performing ACT average composite score of any class since the state required all students to take the ACT, posting an average of 19.4, making Louisiana the most improved state in the nation that assess all students;
- earned a record amount of college credit on Advanced Placement (AP) assessments, with more than 8 percent of graduates earning a score of 3+, and achieved greater annual improvement than in any state other than Massachusetts; and,
- exceeded the previous graduating class on proficiency in core high school subjects on End-of-Course tests, with 6.5 percent more students achieving Good or Excellent than the class of 2014.

Louisiana's Graduation Rate: 10-Year History

As a result of higher expectations, Louisiana's high school graduation rate has dramatically improved over the course of the last 10 years.



Louisiana's Graduation Rate Growth Outpacing the Nation

Nationally, schools reported an average graduation rate growth of 0.9 percent, and 4.1 percent over the last five years.

By comparison, Louisiana has raised its graduation rate 10.3 percent in the past five years and has closed the national gap from 11 percent in 2010 to only 4.8 percent in 2015.

Louisiana and U.S. Cohort Graduation Rates





Increasing Graduation Opportunities for All Students

Over the past five years, Louisiana has increased graduation opportunities for all students, including those historically underserved.

Statewide, graduation rates have increased 12.5 percent for African American students, 9.9 percent for economically disadvantaged students, and 14 percent for students with disabilities in the past five years.

Increasing Expectations for Louisiana's Graduates

While Louisiana has made great strides in providing students with increased opportunities and pathways to college and careers, there is still more work to do.

A high school diploma is no longer enough to earn graduates a living wage in today's economy. Some form of postsecondary education or training is essential, but too few of our students are meeting these expectations.

- Ninety percent of Louisiana's students eligible for TOPS accept the scholarship, while only 21 percent of students eligible for TOPS Tech scholarships, which funds Associate degree opportunities, accept the award.
- Louisiana forecasts show jobs requiring associate's degrees or other credentials that take less than a year to achieve will grow 19 percent through 2018.
- At least 55 percent of all new jobs will require 1–2 years of specialized education and training.
