The Child Welfare and Attendance Supervisor will conduct attendance meetings each grading period with parents of students who are chronically absent. This will begin the first 9 weeks of school. The CWA will initially target students who have 3 or more unexcused absences. Notice will be given to parents of when to attend the meeting with the CWA and school admin. The family, CWA, and the school will come up with a plan to improve attendance. Social media platforms and signage will share research about the implications of missing instructional time. Flyers will be

distributed at schools promoting the attendance policy and highlighting reasons why attendance is beneficial for their child's educational success.

Individual School Attendance Teams will analyze their attendance data. Schools will provide incentives for students in attendance everyday throughout the year.

The CWA will provide PD and support to the school attendance teams by working with them to provide:

Funds will be available to all schools for intensive, targeted, need-based tutoring. Schools will develop plans based on academic weaknesses identified by assessments and screeners. Funds will be allocated to schools based on K-2 Literacy Screening data, 3rd-12th LEAP. Students scoring below benchmark on literacy screening data, and below mastery on LEAP or EOC will be prioritized. Additionally, our labeled schools will receive prioritized funding to carry out recovery and acceleration efforts. Targeted interventions will occur during the school day, in after school tutoring, and for summer learning using evidenced based strategies and programs. With these endeavors in place, WPSS is committed to moving more students to develop proficiency in reading and scoring mastery and above on state assessments.

The Washington Parish School System has been awarded a BJA grant through the Department of Justice in the amount of \$719,568.38. The grant is being used to purchase an Integrated Electronic Access System. The software connects visitors to the security access and building alert system. The system includes video and voice capabilities at main entry points, video of the person requesting entry can be viewed and conversation from the administration desk may take place. An entry point button is located at the same desk.

The grant also will make it possible to have an active shooter notification system at each school as well as a mass notification system.

WPSS will contract with a certified network engineer to update and maintain firewalls. Admin access has been removed from workstations to prevent malicious downloads on devices. Multi-factor authentication is required for all users to access email and also for all administrator logins. GFA accounting software is backed nightly to a tape and the cloud on a ten day rotation. The newest tape is stored off-site. The active directory server is backed up the Microsoft Data Protection Management server at Central Office and off-site to an additional server.
