The 21-22 data indicated students are still recovering from learning loss impacted by COVID-19.OUR 22-23 data indicated that all students in grades 1-8 were impacted by COVID-19 and therefore all students are receiving additional support during instructional time. We saw overall growth from the beginning of the year iReady to the last assessment in 22-23. The growth of students on or above grade level from beginning of the year to the end of the year on iReady -

Reading is as follows: Kindergarten 11 % to 91%; 1st grade 15% to 57%; 2nd grade 13% to 58%; 3rd grade 23% to 45%; 4th grade 14% to 37%; 5th grade 10% to 26%; 6th grade 10% to 23%; 7th grade 17 % to 24%; and 8th grade 17% to 31%. Math data is as follows: Kindergarten 9 % to 74%; 1st grade 4% to 34%; 2nd grade 4% to 30%; 3rd grade 4% to 15%; 4th grade 2% to 31%; 5th grade 4% to 26%; 6th grade 8% to 25%; 7th grade 2 % to 14%; and 8th grade 4% to 10%.

Hynes-Parkview will take a targeted, student-based approach to addressing the needs of our below-level students. Teachers use our weekly PLCs and the quarterly Impact Day to analyze data to determine the areas of intervention needed by students. Every day, students are assigned time on iReady which provides them with individualized paths for intervention in ELA and math. During these 15 minutes, students are pulled into small groups to address deficits from previous learning or to front load new skills. Our teachers also monitor learning throughout the lesson to decide which students may need to be pulled to a small group quickly for in the moment intervention. Additionally, we create intervention schedules for our students to attend small group interventions with teachers during their enrichment time.

Some topics include unpacking the curriculum, intellectual planning and review of student work samples, and grade level pacing. Hynes has partnered with TNTP to ensure that best practices for PLCs are implemented with fidelity. Teachers will implement the use of small group learning in math instruction to provide targeted support to address academic gaps in math skills. Teachers have access to high-impact structures, systems, and aligned resources through PLCs. PLCs will prepare teachers to lead highly effective instructional practices in math.

A 1-year advanced endpoint protection device license was purchased from Cyber Deception Services LLC.

Our Cyber Security was upgraded to protect our digital platforms from cyber attacks. All staff is required to take cybersecurity training.

All employees are required to complete an online Email and Messaging Safety training course through Vector: Email is the primary means of attack from cyber-perpetrators. This course provides an overview of cybercrime via email, and how to employ safe email and messaging practices to avoid and help prevent cyber threats, attempts at fraud and identity theft.
