Advanced Placement (AP) courses give students the opportunity to tackle college-level work while still attending high school. Through AP Exams, students can earn college credit and placement.

Funding Streams for AP Exams

The following funding programs can be used to fund AP Exams for students:

- Minimum Foundation Program (MFP)
- ESSER III These funds expire September 30, 2024.
- <u>Title 1</u> For low income students who are housed in a Title I school.
- Title IV AP/Dual Enrollment/IB assessment and course-related fees for low-income students.
- <u>Title V</u> Rural Program could cover AP expenditures.
- <u>Direct Student Services (DSS)</u> For districts that still have prior year funding they have not been utilized.
