This guide provides you with a quick overview of what you can expect this school year, how you can engage with your child's teacher(s) to ensure your child is on track throughout the school year, and what resources are available to support learning at home.

# WHAT ARE Educational Standards? WHY ARE THEY IMPORTANT?

- »--- Set clear and consistent learning expectations for students and teachers
- »--> Define what students should know and be able to do by the end of the year in a particular subject at each grade level
- »→ Help set high goals for all students

ensure that all students, regardless of their address, background, or ability, have a clear roadmap to success in college or a career. Clearly defined goals help families and teachers work together to ensure that students succeed, have access to extra assistance when they need it, and are challenged appropriately.

# WHAT WILL LEARNING look like this year?

### STUDENT LEARNING

- S Investigate, evaluate, and reason scientifically
- Connect scientific thinking and ideas across different disciplines
- S Examine sources to learn content and make connections among people, events, and ideas across time and place
- S Express claims supported by evidence from sources and outside knowledge
- O Develop deep understanding, skill, and fluency in math
- Think critically in math through speaking, writing, and solving problems
- Apply math and science content knowledge to real-world problems and tasks
- Suild knowledge, discuss, and write about topics, themes, and ideas in complex texts
- Support thoughts and opinions about complex texts using evidence

### ASSESSMENTS/SCREENERS

#### **Beginning of the Year**

To address unfinished learning from the previous school year, school systems will:

- administer appropriate screeners, diagnostics, and/or curriculum-embedded assessments;
- analyze student results and communicate each student's readiness with parents; and
- address unfinished learning within the grade-level work using curriculum-specific guidance

#### **During the Year**

School systems continue to monitor learning and provide acceleration through individual or small group tutoring as needed throughout the year to ensure students are making adequate progress.

#### End of the Year

Students in grades 3 through 8 will take the LEAP 2025 tests for ELA, math, science, and social studies; students in English I, English II, Algebra I, Geometry, Biology, and US History courses will take the LEAP 2025 tests.

School systems can choose to provide students in grades 3 and 4 the LEAP 2025 tests online or on paper, while students in grades 5-8 and high school will take the tests online.



# HOW CAN I SUPPORT student learning at home (grades 3-8)?

At home, you can play an important role in setting high expectations for learning and supporting your child. Building this understanding of what your child knows and should be able to do begins with meaningful conversations with your child and your child's teacher(s). By taking these small steps, you will be helping your child become successful.

Take the time each week to talk with your child about what they are learning. ASK YOUR CHILD QUESTIONS:

STUDENT

CONVERSATIONS

What are you learning in \_\_\_\_\_ class?

Do you understand what you are learning?

Do you want to learn more about a subject that you are doing really well in or about a topic being discussed?

Is there anything in this subject or class that you don't understand and feel you need more help with?



TEACHER CONVERSATIONS

Start off the school year by having a conversation with your child's teacher(s) about how your child performed last year, and what supports they may need or challenges they may face this year to ensure success with the skills required in each class or subject.

ASK THE TEACHER QUESTIONS:

Where did my child do well and where do they need improvement?

What can be done to help improve their area(s) of weakness?

What can be done to appropriately challenge my child in areas where they exceeded the expectations?

How can I help support my child's learning at home?


