# **Principal Corner**



Hello Louisiana Principals, and greetings from Plaquemines Parish!

In the short five years I've served as principal of Belle Chasse Elementary School (BCES), I (like many of you) have weathered the events battering education. Now, on what seems to be the other side of the storm, I'm honored to share with you some professional reflection around our school's growth over the past few years. Our school has two main areas of focus that we try to balance - Positive Culture and Student Achievement.

At BCES, we focus on improving student outcomes while at the same time providing a positive school culture and climate which allows for both student and staff growth. The culture at Belle Chasse Elementary is one of acceptance and support, rooted in kindness and respect for all who walk through our doors. I value the expertise of the incredible, highly effective educators on my staff. Our teacher leaders and Content Leaders facilitate

PLCs and professional development that foster great collaboration and have been proven to transfer into more rigorous instruction. The voice of my teachers and staff is important to me. I regularly solicit their feedback and use it in making decisions for our school. It is important to me that my staff feels appreciated for the hard work they do each day.

As a school district and a school, we have invested resources and hard work into analyzing student data to make intentional and purposeful decisions around teaching and learning. Our school population includes many diverse learners who deserve equal access to every available support academically, socially, and emotionally. Teaching 100% of the students 100% of the curriculum 100% of the time, is one

of my core beliefs as I have learned from Data to Information (D2i), and this belief drives the decisions I make for students each day. Intentional, data-driven changes in curriculum, interventions, and instructional practices have allowed for positive growth and results for students. We have celebrated growth in our ELA and Math Proficiency, Assessment and Progress Indices. The academic changes we have made have not been easy or even embraced by all, but they have been necessary and have proven to be beneficial for our students. Supporting teachers and staff through these changes in curriculum, planning and instruction, and meeting the needs of all students is a goal I set for myself each year.

This 2022-2023 school year has a different feel for me as a school leader. There is a tremendous sense of pride in all we have accomplished despite some of the most challenging times in education. There is a great sense of unity, perseverance, and drive as we continue to strive for excellence at Belle Chasse Elementary. There is an unwavering commitment to our students - a commitment to meet their individual needs each day in a safe, respectful, and kind environment. We have made great strides as a school and district, but we are "Stepping It Up" as we focus on achieving excellence. I hope this school year proves to be a positive one for you as well!

# **LDOE Corner**

The Division of Diverse Learners aims to work in partnership with school systems, families, and communities to increase outcomes for diverse learners across Louisiana. The Division's work is primarily grounded in the state priority removing barriers and creating equitable, inclusive learning experiences for all children.

Students with disabilities and English Learners in Louisiana are most importantly STUDENTS first. We strive to give each student what they need to succeed in accessing high-quality teaching and learning.

#### Students with Disabilities

Based on our most recent LEAP data, students with disabilities saw a 1% increase in mastery indicating some learning recovery. However, regular education students also saw an increase



and so the achievement gap remains. We celebrate the resilience of our leaders and educators over the past few years, and we know that now more than ever we must continue to be intentional in our support and intervention. Change in this trend must begin with a growth mindset and a belief in all students' abilities.

We know that in order to begin to close achievement gaps for students with disabilities we must provide these high leverage three basic best practices to students with disabilities:

- a focus on high quality core instruction,
- extra time to learn (in addition to uninterrupted core instruction), and
- content strong teachers.

We also know that along with these basic best practices, combined with specially designed instruction, such as the related services, accommodations and supports outlined in the IEP, that we will set the vast majority of our students with disabilities up for success. We also know that there is a small population of students who need much more intense supports.

#### English Learners

Louisiana's English Learners (ELs) have remained stagnant in their performance on LEAP, but they did demonstrate some gains in English Language proficiency on the English Language Proficiency Test (ELPT) assessment. Providing ELs with equal access and opportunity to high-quality instruction requires school-site leaders to design and implement school structures and instructional models that allow language acquisition to occur across all content areas all day, every day. Often, these students will need additional time built into their day to support English language development.

Our state's strategy to close achievement gaps for ELs is very similar to that of students with disabilities. ELs need:

- high-quality, standards-based core instruction alongside their English speaking peers,
- ongoing *progress monitoring* to support and accelerate learning, and
- Two-Way Language Immersion models in schools where there is an established EL population of a common language.

While this work may be some of the most challenging, it is also some of the most rewarding. The Department believes in you as leaders and in our educators! You see the ABILITIES of all children.

# Student Learning Target (SLT) Guidance

Teachers and leaders may begin setting student learning targets (SLTs) for the 2022-2023 school year. A number of resources are available in the <a href="Compass Library">Compass Library</a> to support educators in this process. The <a href="SLT">SLT</a> <a href="Assessment Identification Guide">Assessment Identification Guide</a> provides a list of state approved assessments to assist in measuring students' attainment of learning targets. Approved literacy screeners and high quality curriculum based assessments are encouraged when available. The <a href="Teacher Student Learning Target (SLT) Guidance and Sample Templates">Templates</a> outlines the types of targets and process for setting targets and provides sample templates. The <a href="Student Learning Target FAQ">Student Learning Target FAQ</a> provides answers to common questions pertaining to student learning targets.

Act 333 and Bulletin 130 now require a meeting between evaluator and evaluatee to discuss student learning targets. Student learning targets not discussed in a meeting between evaluator and evaluatee shall not be used in evaluation. The sample student learning target template includes a signature space to acknowledge a meeting. Additionally, the Compass Information System (CIS) includes language for the user to acknowledge a meeeting between evaluator and evaluatee.

# <u>Assessment Development Educator Review Committee</u>

The Division of Assessment Content will convene committees for LEAP 2025 Science, new LEAP Social Studies, and LEAP Connect assessments.

LEAP 2025 Science Stimuli Review Committees:

- 1. Convene in person in Lafayette on selected Saturdays in January and February for grades 3, 5, 6, 7 and 8.
- 2. Review proposed stimuli to ensure that the content aligns to the Louisiana Student Standards for Science, the selections are clearly worded with grade-appropriate language, and the selections are appropriate for all Louisiana students by being free of bias and sensitivity concerns.
- 3. Participants will receive a half-day stipend and will be reimbursed by the vendor for mileage to and from the meeting.

The LEAP Social Studies Item Review Committees for grades 3-8 and high school Civics:

- 1. Convene virtually in January–March.
- 2. Include 10 educators, mainly classroom teachers and instructional leads with extensive content knowledge, grade-level expertise, and/or specialized experience.
- 3. Review items to ensure that they align to the 2022 Louisiana Student Standards for Social Studies, accurately reflect course content and grade-level expectations, use clear wording, and are fair and appropriate for all Louisiana students.
- 4. Complete synchronous and asynchronous reviews, with two full-day meetings required in winter 2023 and in spring 2023.
- 5. Receive stipends and/or substitute reimbursements per guidelines for completed reviews and meetings.

LEAP Connect Content and Bias Review Committees:

- 4. convene in January in a virtual platform
- 5. Review new item development to ensure that the content aligns to the Louisiana Connectors, is clearly worded with grade-appropriate language, and is appropriate for all Louisiana students by being free of bias and sensitivity concerns
- 6. schools may receive appropriate substitute reimbursement, as needed.

# **STEM Professional Learning and Resources Now Available**

STEM professional learning and resources are now available through an in-person learning opportunity being offered by the Louisiana Transportation Research Center, a Division of the Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development. The <u>TRAC and RIDES programs</u> are used to introduce students in grades K-12 to the work world of transportation and civil engineering and inspire them to consider careers in those fields. This workshop offers teachers hands-on training through activities designed to align with standards and used to facilitate problem solving skills and higher order thinking. The TRAC (TRAnsportation and Civil Engineering) program is intended for use in grades 7-12 and RIDES (Roadways Into Developing Elementary Students) is intended for grades K-6. Each attendee will receive a manual that consists of over 100 activities and each school will leave with one "trunk" of materials to use in classrooms.
